Professional undergraduate study of Nursing, Šibenik University of Applied Sciences is awarded with 180 ECTS credits that are earned through enrolled courses. When enrolling in the academic year, the student enrolls in compulsory subjects and optional subjects, the total sum of which is 30 ECTS points per semester and respectively 60 ECTS points per year, according to the Study Regulations at the Šibenik University of Applied Sciences.

Acquisition of ECTS points

A student can earn ECTS points for subjects he/she enrolls in – compulsory and optional, by writing a final paper, attending practical classes, and other activities provided for in the study program. Load coefficients, expressed in ECTS points, become earned points only after passing the exam, or other requirements fulfilled in accordance with the curriculum.

Enrollment in higher study year

A student enrolls at least 60 ECTS credits in one study year. A student acquires the right to enroll in a higher study year if, by the enrollment deadline, he/she has properly fulfilled all obligations from the study program that he/she undertook by enrolling in the previous year of study and passed exams in subjects that, according to the point system and determined by the study program, enable him/her to enroll in the higher year of study. Students who, in the current academic year, took an exam in front of the teaching committee (commission) and did not meet the conditions for a positive evaluation (passed the exam), have the obligation to re-enroll, listen, and regulate the obligations for that course. Students enroll higher study year if they have within the previous study year acquired minimally 50 ECTS points and in the way that from the previous study year they enroll all unpassed subjects and at least 60 ECTS credits from higher study year.

Repeating a year with the possibility of partially enrolling in subjects from a higher study year

Students have the right to repeat a study year with partial enrollment in subjects from a higher study year under the following conditions:

- Partial entry of subjects from the second (2.) year of study if they have at least 30 ECTS in the first (1.) study year
- Partial entry of subjects from the third (3.) year of study if they have at least 30 ECTS in the second (2.) study year

Partial enrollment of courses is carried out in such a way that the student enrolls all unpassed courses from the previous academic year, as well as certain courses from a higher study year. The total number of ECTS points when repeating the year with the possibility of partial enrollment is a minimum of 50 ECTS points, and a maximum of 60 ECTS points.

Repeating the year

Student who has not acquired the right to enrollment in higher study year is obliged to enroll the repetition of the study year in the next academic year.

Completion of study

Professional undergraduate study ends with passing of all exams from the enrolled subjects, fulfilling other obligations, and preparing and defending the Final Thesis. Before submitting the Final Thesis for assessment and defense, the student must pass all subjects.

1. REQUIREMENTS AND RESULTS OF STUDY PROGRAM

After completing their studies and acquiring knowledge, students acquire the professional title of bachelor's degree in nursing, i.e., the competences of a nurse for general health care, which entails:

- knowing human health and the influence of physical and social environment,
- knowing nature and ethics of the profession and general principles of health and healthcare,
- appropriate clinical experience - which should be acquired under the supervision of qualified nursing staff and in places where the number of qualified staff and equipment are adequate for the health care of patients,
- ability to participate in the practical training of health personnel and experience in working with these personnel,
- experience in common work with members of other professions in health sector.

Upon completion of the studies, bachelor's degree holders will have the competences to perform all the tasks of a professional bachelor's degree in nursing (nurses for general health care). The study program and its learning outcomes are aligned with Directive 2005/36 EC [1] and Directive 2013/55EU, which refers to amendments to Directive 2005/36/EC on the recognition of professional qualifications [2].

After completed study bachelors will be trained to perform the following jobs and tasks from the scope of their work - health care. They will be competent (have competences) for:

- implementation of nursing practice based on knowledge of anatomy, physiology, biology, biophysics, public health, pathology, pathophysiology, pharmacology and microbiology and other biomedical fields, then statistics and informatics necessary for defining, analysis and proposing procedures in biomedicine and healthcare
- application of professional, ethical and legislative regulations in the field of health care while respecting the principles of holistic nursing care
- assess the condition of the patient/client using all tools and aids, including all factors (physical, social, cultural, psychological, spiritual and environmental)
- data collection, recognition and interpretation of patients' conditions that deviate from normal, and based on the collected data, assessment and establishment of nursing diagnosis

- planning, application and evaluation of appropriate and individualized health care in cooperation with the patient/client, caregivers, family and other health professionals and team members
- providing health care aimed at meeting basic human needs to patients/clients of all ages with various health problems, taking into account cultural, social and economic aspects
- critical judgment, evaluation and interpretation of scientific evidence when introducing it into practice in order to ensure high-quality care
- organization and carrying out diagnostic tests and therapeutic procedures independently or in a team
- recognition of life-threatening conditions and implementation of interventions in accordance with competencies
- education and undertaking activities aimed at preserving the health, well-being and comfort of individuals, families, groups and communities whose health is threatened by illness, damage or death
- creation activities and participation in procedures/actions in promotion of health and protection against illness of the individual, family and community
- monitoring human growth and development through all life cycles in health and illness and undertaking activities that contribute to their improvement
- application of skills and techniques of appropriate communication in the native or foreign language in education of individuals, families and community and on occasions of cooperation with others member teams
- assessment of needs and active participation in different projects with goal of improving and ensuring standards of nursing practice with continuous evaluation, and for rational management of material and non-material resources
- participation in the education of nurses and other health professionals/ and/or associates
- application of modern information and communication technology in written, spoken and electronic form

2. LEARNING OUTCOMES OF PROFESSIONAL UNDERGRADUATE STUDY OF NURSING

3. PLACE OF TEACHING AT THE PROFESSIONAL UNDERGRADUATE STUDY IN NURSING

Teaching at the professional undergraduate study program in Nursing takes place at the **Šibenik University of Applied Sciences, Trg Andrije Hebranga 11, Šibenik**. At the mentioned location, in addition to the service office, there are 15 classrooms, including a skills cabinet and a health care cabinet, with a total area of 1320 m².

In addition to the headquarters of the University, the teaching base for the professional undergraduate study in Nursing be will: Clinical hospital center Rijeka, Clinical hospital center Split, General Hospital of Šibenik-Knin County, Knin General and Veterans Hospital, Biograd na Moru Special Orthopedic Hospital, Požega County General Hospital, Public Health Institute of Šibenik-Knin County, Šibenik Health Centre, Smilje Kindergarten.

Spaces in which the educational process takes place provide optimal conditions considering the enrolled number of students. The mentioned area contains spatial capacities that follow the standards of higher education classes which enable students to have quality assessment and participation in teaching activities.

Teaching at the Šibenik University of Applied Sciences takes place from Monday to Friday (in exceptional cases on Saturdays in the morning hours) according to the schedule of the lectures published on the official website. In accordance with requirements of the Regulations on content of conditions for the issuance of a permit for the performance of higher education activities, the implementation of study programs and the reaccreditation of higher education institutions (Official Gazzette, number 24/10) article 5, paragraph 2, University of Applied Sciences satisfies ratio number of enrolled students and spatial possibilities for teaching.

The academic calendar of the Šibenik University of Applied Sciences for academic year 2026/2027 was adopted at the 35th session of the Expert Council of the University of Applied Sciences, which was held on April 28, 2026.

Teaching at the professional studies of the Šibenik University of Applied Sciences in the academic year 2026/2027 starts on September 28, 2026.

Classes in the winter semester are held from September 28, 2026 to December 23, 2026 and from January 7, 2027 to January 22, 2027.

Classes in the summer semester are held from February 22, 2027 to June 4, 2027.

Additionally, consultative classes for part-time students will be held at the times prescribed by the Decision on the Adoption of Implementation Plans for Study Programs in the Academic Year 2026/2027.

The winter holidays last from December 24, 2026 to January 6, 2027 and during that period the University will not work with students.

The summer holidays last from July 26, 2027 to August 20, 2027, and during that period the University will not work with students.

The regular winter exam period lasts from January 25, 2027 to February 19, 2027.

The regular summer exam period lasts from June 7, 2027 to July 2, 2027.

The regular autumn exam period lasts from August 23, 2027 to September 17, 2027.

Enrollment in successive years of study for the academic year 2027/2028 will take place from September 13-24, 2027.

Course objectives	The main goal of the course is for the student to acquire basic knowledge of the macroscopic and microscopic morphology of individual organs and organ systems of humans. Acquired knowledge of anatomy should enable the student to better understand the structure of the body, organs and organ systems, physiological, pathophysiological and pathological processes in organisms and to pass clinical subjects and procedures in nursing care.
